COMPUTER SCIENCE (CS)

1. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: The sentence states that the person reached the station late and almost missed the train. The given words are: near-close to something, nearly-not exactly, not completely, mostly-almost all the time, utterly-completely. Out of all the given options, "nearly" is the best fit in the given blank. Hence, the correct answer is option (b).

2. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: This is an analogy question. The term "kind" refers to "variety, type." Just as 'often' means "frequent." Hence, the correct answer is option (b).

3. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: Let us assume there are 100 pregnant women in total. Out of those 100 women, at least 90% received medical help, which means at least 90 women received medical help. Out of these 90 women, 60% received medical help from doctors, in other words, 54 women received medical help from doctors, and the rest 40% received help from healthcare providers. Hence, out of 100 pregnant women, 54 received medical help from doctors. This means more than 50% of the women received help from the doctors. Hence, the correct answer is option (a).

4. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The question asks you to select the option that can be inferred from the given paragraph. The paragraph states that citizens of Zombieland are facing health issues due to the lack of physical exercise. To address this issue, the government decided to incentivize people who commute to work by bicycle. This suggests that the government believes that cycling will resolve the lack of physical exercise. Hence, option (d) can be inferred from the paragraph.

5. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: This is a question of Para jumble. The paragraph is about a woman named "Meena." Sentence (iii) introduces the subject of the paragraph. It will be an obvious opener. (iii) will be followed by (ii), because it carries forward the idea. The option that has this combination of (iii) and (ii) is option (d). Hence, it is the correct answer.

MECHANICAL ENGINEERING (ME)

6. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: The sentence is about a past action. So, the verb in the second part of the sentence must be in the past form and in the passive form. He did not fix the car, the people in the garage had done that and hence, passive form of the verb 'got it fixed' in the garage.

7. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: This is a question of analogy. Children are raised in the same way that seeds are planted. Hence, the correct answer is option (a).

8. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph suggests that Ravi and almost all his friends are studious, kind, and hardworking but not very active in sports. From this, it can be inferred that some of his friends are hardworking and intelligent. Hence, option (d) is the correct answer. Options (a), (b), and (c) can be eliminated because they are extreme options.

9. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph starts with a description of a closed room with a murmuring sound, which is mentioned in the statement (ii). This idea is carried forward by statement (i). The idea is furthered by stating that the person decided to stay in the passage. Hence, the sequence is 2143. Thus, option (c) is the correct answer.

ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING (EE)

10. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: Reporting the message of the speaker in the exact words as spoken by him is called direct speech. Reporting the message of the speaker in our own words is called indirect speech. This question asks you to change direct speech to indirect speech. If the reported verb is in the past tense, the tense of the reporting verb will be changed to the past tense. Hence, the correct answer is option (d).

11. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: This is a question of analogy. The antonym of "enforce" is to "relax" in the same way "permit" is to "forbid." Hence, the correct answer is option (b).

12. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph provides information that the tobacco users were advised to stop consuming tobacco, and out of 10 users, 3 tried to stop consuming it. From this, we can deduce that a majority of the tobacco users who were advised did not try to do so. Hence, option (2) is the correct answer. Option (a) is contrary to the fact, and options (c) and (d) are extrapolating the information given in the passage. Thus, they can be ruled out.

13. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph informs the reader that in order to be eligible to vote, a student must register before the registration deadline. And none of the department of human science students had completed their registration. Thus, it is clear that none of the students from that department will be able to vote. Hence, the correct answer will be option (d).

14. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: The question asks you to identify an option that can't be deduced from the paragraph. In the first line of the paragraph, it is stated that cancer is believed to be a modern disease because its metaphors are so modern. Hence, option (4) is contrary to the information given in the passage. Thus, it is the answer.

Electronics Communication (EC)

Explanation: The sentence states that the person is willing to support the proposal because he feels it will be ethically wrong. "Consciousness" means being aware of and responding to one's surroundings. "Consensus" means a general agreement. Conscience means a person's moral sense of right and wrong. "Consent" means permission for something to happen or agreement to do something. In the given context, the best word is "conscience." Hence, the correct answer is (c).

16. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: Just as the parliament is related to the legislature, the courts are related to the judiciary. Hence, the correct answer is option (a).

17. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph describes a forestland that is inhabited by different kinds of creatures. All creatures that have claws are fierce; among other creatures are animals, which are also fierce. Option (a) states that any creature with claws is an animal. This is incorrect because the paragraph says that all creatures with claws are ferocious; it also states that all animals are ferocious, but from this we can't deduce that all claw-bearing creatures are animals. There is a possibility that some claw-bearing creatures are not animals but other creatures. Hence, option (a) is ruled out. Option (d) is a safe deduction from the passage because if all claw-bearing creatures are ferocious, then there must be some ferocious creatures with claws. Hence, the correct answer is option (d).

18. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: Since the passage starts with "when I was a kid," it is apparent that the paragraph is about an adult's memory of his childhood. Hence, the correct answer is option (b).

19. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph says that the village is positioned between two things. Whenever we

talk about two things, we use “between.” Hence, the correct answer is option (d).

20. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: This is a question of analogy. When someone disagrees, one protests. Similarly, sometimes, people agree with someone or something when they suggest or recommend something. Hence, the correct answer is option (c).

21. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph states that all those residents of the society who are well established in their respective fields happen to be academicians. This means that all of the academicians in the society are well-established. Hence, the correct answer is option (b). Option (a) can be ruled out because it is explicitly stated. Options (c) and (d) are true but are encompassed in option (b). Hence, they are also eliminated.

22. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph states that DNA is used to synthesise proteins. DNA has a coding region and a non-coding region. And coding regions constitute only 2% of human DNA. From the given information, statements (i) and (ii) can be deduced. Hence, the correct answer is option (c).

Hence, the correct answer is option (d). The rest of the options are extreme options, so they can be ruled out.

26. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph states that “some human beings are not cruel creatures, which is a false statement.” This means any creatures that are not cruel can’t be human beings, which means all human beings are cruel creatures. Hence, statement (i) is correct. If all humans are cruel, then no human is kind and thus statement (ii) is deduced. Also, statement (iii) is true in the given light. Hence, the correct answer is option (d).

27. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: The paragraph states that the world bank says that it will help Sri Lanka only if Sri Lanka reforms its macroeconomic policy framework. That means the world bank believes that Sri Lanka’s macroeconomic policies are not in the running right now. Hence, the correct answer will be option (c).

CIVIL ENGINEERING (CE) P1

28. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: The statement says that the person has not decided what he/she will do that evening. The sentence further shows the possibility of visiting a friend. The best fitting word to show possibility is “might.” Hence, the correct answer is option (3).

29. Option (c) is correct.

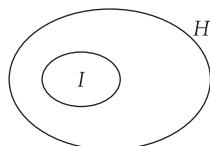
Explanation: This is a question of analogy. Eject is an antonym of insert, in the same manner, the antonym of advance is retreat. Hence, the correct answer is (c).

30. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: In the question, Donald Duck says, “All ducks always lie.” Based on the statement that all ducks lie and Donald Duck is a duck, it can be deduced that he is lying. Hence, the correct answer is option (d).

31. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The statement says some humans are intelligent. This means some intelligent beings are humans. Hence, option (d) is the correct answer.

Option (b) can be derived from the last line (justify epithet) of the paragraph. Option (c) can be inferred from the overall paragraph. Hence, options (a), (b), and (c) are eliminated.

33. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: The line runs through the page. The right preposition to express it is "across." 'Of' is used when referring to inanimate objects, to mean that something belongs to something else. Between is most often used to introduce a prepositional phrase that contains two singular or plural noun phrases. We use across as a

preposition (prep) and an adverb (adv). Across means on the other side of something or from one side to the other of something that has sides or limits, such as a city, road, or river. We use about as an adverb when we talk about time, number, and quantity.

34. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: This is a question of analogy. Seldom is an antonym of often, and in the same manner, the antonym of kind is cruel. Hence, the correct answer is option (a).

35. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: From the third line of the paragraph, statement (iv) can be deduced. Hence, the correct answer is option (d). Statement (iii) is ruled out because the passage states that gifting yellow flowers often signifies that someone is angry with someone. But from this, we can't deduce that there are no other ways of expressing anger.

36. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: "Which annoyed her at times but mostly made her pensive," says the author. From this statement, option (d) can be deduced. Hence, the correct answer is option (d). From the last line, option (c) can be negated.
